



#### **Main Indicators:**

X transformation partnerships develop positively according to **success factors for transformation partnerships**, i.e. they have joint transformation vision, joint progress & impact management system, leadership and action competence, a supporting actor network (success factors compare World Resources Institute).


X% actors of supported transformation partnerships confirm their **positive contribution** to transforming food systems with an example.

X% women in these partnerships confirm that they are empowered (co-benefit for gender transformation) to shape the food system transformation.




Figure 4: The course of transformations over time



## Learning and transformative capacities From action to learning to competence



Regularly recorded **success criteria** (*relative* progress):

- Learning progress (1st to 3rd order)
- Perceptions of legitimacy, relevance and credibility, ownership...
- Progress with transformative visions and 'tipping potential'
- Jointly defined absolute quantitative and qualitative indicators for progress of transformation as such (e.g. type, share, affordability of renewables, organic local food, circular products...)
- ...and its influence at highest goal level (ends like SDGs, social and environmental wellbeing, common good...)

Goals remain focused, indicators adjust.

**Rapid learning loops** > increasing transformational capacity > exponential impacts over time (compare diffusion of (transformative) innovation curve).
